But with the exception of some of the most common ones, you may not know what types of birds they are. Fortunately, it is easy to learn to identify birds with attention to their appearance, behavior and other characteristics, and familiarizing themselves with the types that live in their area. Birdwatching is a hobby that you can practice anywhere in the world where you are surrounded by nature. You could enjoy yourself so much by learning about your local birds that you begin to devote yourself more seriously to the hobby. But for now, learn who is taking flight in your own courtyard.Family yourself with birds and common groupsBefore you begin, it is useful to know some basic concepts about birds, considering that only in the United States and Canada live more than 800 bird species. But not all birds live in the same regions, so you will begin to reduce them. Read books and visit websites about the birds in your area to familiarize yourself with the most common species. You may find that some are easy to detect immediately, particularly if they have unique colors. Get a field guide for reference. Most of the birds in the backyards belong to about 15 to 20 groups, which are divided into categories such as pigeons, woodpeckers, sparrows, nightbirds, finches and sparrows, among others. Finding out which group a bird belongs makes it much easier to identify.When it comes to individual birds, it can be hard to find out the family at first. Start by seeing your size and shape. Some experts recommend familiarizing themselves with a specific bird that is common in your area so you can use it to compare it. PhotoGary Carter/Corbis Documental/Getty Documental/Getty The cardinals, for example, can be common in their garden, and their red feathers make them easy to detect. Familiarize yourself with the size and shape of the cardinal, and compare these characteristics to the next bird you see. Maybe it's smaller or larger or has a more round body and a longer tail. Note how long the legs are, the shape of the eyes and the length and width of the tail. You will also want to pay attention to the size and shape of the bill. Use binoculars if you find it difficult to choose some of these features. It is possible that the colors and color of Markings's Bird can be one of the first things that you notice about it, and can help you reduce your options. Note that it may not always be accurate enough to help you determine a bird definitively: that is because some bird feathers change colors with seasons. In some cases, male and female birds of the same species are totally different colors. Lighting can also highlight or hide true colors of a bird. Of course, most birds are not all one color. They may have special marks on various parts of their bodies, so again use those binoculars to search for clues. Appearance doesn't tell you much or just helps you to reduce your options a little, pay attention to your behaviors. Walk down the ground or stay in the trees? Do you stay around other birds or spend time alone? Are you looking for food in the grass or in the bark of the tree? Some birds fly on their own, while others are kept together with the birds of the same species. Some fly high, whileothers move up and down, and some fly in a diagonal or zig-zig pattern. Of course, some are slow and some are fast. Just be prepared to pay close attention when one bird takes flight, or could fly to another. another. Where you'll lose sight of yourself. Finally, take into account where the bird's habitat is. Whether you build a nest in a forest, live in an area covered with grass, live in bushes, live near the water or prefer an open area, this information can help guide you. List to your voice or Songit is also possible to identify a bird by listening to the sounds you make. Sometimes it can be hard to find out which song or voice goes with what bird. However, in the long term, it can make the identification of birds anywhere much easier. Once you have learned how to identify birds by songs and calls, it is a skill that you can continue to use. It can help you take notes if you need it. If you can see the bird that's making the sounds, try to remember what it looks like, and if you can't see it, that's fine. You can search online by describing the song or using a service like the Audubon app to enter all the information you have about the bird and find results.
